GYM GROUNDBREAKING APRIL 25

Ground will be broken for UMB's \$8.9-million physical education facility on the Harbor Campus at noon, April 25. The project is expected to be completed by the fall of 1979.

University trustees voted earlier to name the comprehensive complex the "Catherine Forbes Clark Physical Education Center" in memory of the Dorchester community leader and University trustee who died last November. Mrs. Clark had been a staunch proponent of such a facility for many years.

The principal participants in the ground breaking ceremony include: President Franklin Patterson; UMass-Boston Chancellor Claire Van Ummersen; Mrs. Allen Shorr of Dorchester, daughter of Mrs. Clark; Joseph P. Healey, chairman of the Board of Trustees; and student trustee Jim O'Sullivan.

The Proposed facility will include a gymnasium and evercise rooms, a swimming pool and a skating rink. It will be located adjacent to the Administration building and will be at ground level rather than raised above any parking facilities as are the other buildings on campus.

The complex will be available for community use. All members of the University community are cordially invited to attend the groundbreaking.

Designed by Anderson, Notter Associates of Boston, the structure's major units will branch out from a core of locker rooms and shower facilities. D. Antonellis, Inc., of Boston, the lowest of six bidders, is the prime contractor for the construction program.



UNIVERSITY WITHOUT WALLS PROGRAM

Officials of the University of Massachusetts' University Without Walls Program (UWW) have begun discussions with UMB administrators and faculty members in an effort to formalize relations between the UWW staff and UMB. Mandated in 1971 by the UMA Faculty Senate, UWW maintains an office at the Park Square campus where an advisor-administrator currently serves some 55 Boston area students.

The Boston Cluster of the UWW program is coordinated by Professor Mark D. Levine, a veteran non-traditional educator who has developed and worked in related programs at Brooklyn College, The New School for Social Research, Empire State College, and New York Institute for Technology. He says development of the program on the Campus would provide an opportunity for intercampus collaboration as well as an active role for the UMB community in the "creating and guiding of its particular variant of this significant contemporary form of education."

PORTUGUESE AGRARIAN REFORM

Professor Susan C. Schneider, director of Latin American Studies in the History Dept., recently delivered a paper on "Portuguese Agrarian Reform" at the annual meeting in Chicago of the Society of Spanish and Portuguese Historians. She also spoke about her experience as the only American living on a Portuguese collective farm during a sabbatical. Currently, she is writing a book comparing efforts of Portuguese and Latin American land reforms.

DR. EDWARD MURRAY DIES

The University community was saddened to learn of the death of Dr. Edward Murray, a professor of Microbiology at Harvard University and a staff member of the UMB Health Services Dept. He passed away on March 26.

MOBILE BOOK EXHIBIT

The UMB Bookshop has extended a cordial invitation to all faculty members to visit the College Marketing Group's mobile book exhibit on the Harbor Campus plaza from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m., April 18.

Bookshop manager Julio Laranjo says some 3,000 new titles from 275 publishers, freshman through graduate texts, will be available for viewing. Many of the texts are complimentary when particular books fit the course. The exhibit will permit professors to preview new titles, not just from brochures, but with the books actually in hand.

REMINDER RE FINAL FISCAL DATES

Controller Byron Drinkwater again reminds the University community that the final date for budget change forms (budget transfer of funds from one department to another) will be Friday, April 21. Additionally the date to encumber on state funds will be Friday May 5. All requisitions (CD-9) must be in Purchasing on that date.

Drinkwater also notes that honorial and travel payments submitted in May and June from existing departmental budgets will take considerably longer due to the closing of the fiscal year. Any department having travel authorizations encumbered against their accounts for trips that were actually not taken -- should notify Accounting immediately.

AIDS COUNCIL CANDIDATE

Professor John Papegeorgiou of CPS has been notified that he has been selected as a candidate for election to the Council of the American Institute for Decision Sciences.

Laurence Moore, chairman of the National AIDS Nominating Committee, says Prof.

Papegeorgiou was nominated for a Council post because of his "past contributions and interests in AIDS, and national scholarly reputation." Election of new Council members will occur in October.

Prof. Papegeorgiou also is the author of an extensive article in the latest issue of the International Journal of Bio-Medical Computing. The piece is entitled: "Some Operations Research Applications to Problems of Health Care Systems (A Survey)."
