I am pleased to welcome all members of the faculty and staff to the fourth year in the life of the University of Massachusetts, Boston. Our "college" opens its Senior year classes with at least 3400 students on September 16th. We shall, as before, be working under handicaps of space, staff and communications, especially in the opening weeks of the term. We must, as before, ask each other for an extra measure of patience, of improvisation and of concern for each other's well-being. I hope to discuss with you the state of the University, its present problems and prospects, at the first faculty meeting. Shortly afterward, on October 1st, Francis Lyons Broderick will assume his duties as Chancellor of the University. Meanwhile, I wish you a good beginning to our senior year and I assure you that my office is always open to you for any help I can give.

Chancellor Broderick

On August 12th, the Board of Trustees approved the appointment of Francis Lyons Broderick as Chancellor of the University of Massachusetts, Boston. Dr. Broderick, who has been serving as Dean of Lawrence and Downer Colleges at Lawrence University, Appleton, Wisconsin, Will assume his duties here on October 1st. Dean Broderick received his A.B. degree from Princeton University and the Ph.D. degree, in American history, from Harvard University. He is the author of numerous books and articles on American history and before taking his post at Lawrence University was director of the Peace Corps in Ghana. Chancellor and Mrs. Broderick, with their four children, will reside at 23 Appleton Street, in the South End.

First Faculty Meeting

The first general faculty meeting of the academic year 1968-69 will be held on Tuesday, September 24th at 12:30 P.M. (the "free hour") in the Auditorium. The Acting Dean will speak on the state of the University, and present an agenda of tasks for 1968-69. An informal question period will follow.

Attached to this bulletin is a copy of the Academic Calendar for 1968-69. The date of the University's first Commencement will be announced early in the fall term.

Attached to this Bulletin is a temporary partial Directory of offices and telephone extensions. A complete Directory of faculty and staff will not be issued until final moves have been made and telephones connected.

The additional space being leased for University use will not be ready for the start of school. Until the space is available, and departments which are being moved to new quarters take occupancy, substantial crowding will occur. This crowding will last from one week to one month after the start of the academic year. The scheduled date of moves, by department, follows. All moves will be made on weekends to minimize disruption.

These departments, after the move, will have telephone service to the departmental office. Full telephone service will be installed as soon as possible. The prolonged telephone strike, only recently settled, has resulted in a heavy backlog of installation orders.
