STUDENT AWARDS ANNOUNCED AT COMMENCEMENT

Diane Kimbrell of Boston received the John F Kennedy Award for Academic Excellence. This award is presented each year to the graduating senior who has compiled the most impressive academic record as an undergraduate and who demonstrates a high potential for future contribution to society. Kimbrell received a B S in biology. In the fall, she will attend Mt Sinai Medical School in N Y C.

Sarah Boslaugh of Boston received the Alvan S Ryan Award for Distinguished Graduate Study in English. This award is presented to the outstanding graduate student in English, in commemoration of the awarding of the title Professor Emeritus to Alvan S Ryan, first UMB professor to retire to receive the honor.

Boslaugh earned her B A from the U of Neb. She received an M A in English and plans to enter the U of Chicago to pursue a graduate degree in library science.

Maria Motta of Melrose received the John W Ryan Award for achieving the highest cumulative average for four semesters during freshman and sophomore years. She is a member of the CAS class of 1982 and is completing a double major in English and Italian.




