# Psych 430-Undergraduate Internship in Psychology

## Summary/Abstract

This is a 6-credit Capstone course, Psychology majors intern 15 hours/week at a wide variety of human service agencies around Massachusetts. They in a weekly seminar to share their experiences, course readings, and have case presentations that complement the learning experience. In addition, this course also a service and learning components. Service: Students provide much needed assistance to clients in agencies that are often underfunded and under-staffed. The intern offers 1-1 support and caring to children, adolescents, and adults struggling to improve their lives. Learning: The experience of joining a professional staff in a hospital or agency offers a chance to learn and grow on many levels. Students learn about themselves as they see first hand how agencies attempt to assist those with psychological problems. The economic and political challenges that plague the delivery of services become abundantly clear, as do the rewards that come with a career in human services.

## Goals and Objectives

The internship program aims to provide psychology majors with hands-on experience working in a mental health/human service agency within a supportive learning context. Its objectives include clarifying career goals and aspirations, enabling students to be more focused. The program is also aimed at providing students with a successful transition from an academic role, with support, into real work in mental health, enabling them to be employed, contributing to an increase in their self confidence, maturity and communication skill.

## Approaches and Methods

Students work directly with our community partners, supporting their treatment and experiencing the workings of the agency under the supervision of experienced staff, where they directly observe the roles of various mental health personnel, learn about how agencies function, and gain an introductory exposure to the network of mental health services in Greater Boston. Students have an opportunity to see the application of their coursework in real-life settings, test their ability to function in a professional setting, and explore career paths. The seminar allows students to process the challenges and personal growth opportunities that occur at the placement. The internship serves as a bridge for students to make the journey from the classroom to the professional world.

# Results and Next Steps

### **Impact on Students**

Apart from meeting its objectives, this program has the following impact on participating students:

## **Impact on Community Partners**

This in turn has helped the Psychology department in its of curriculum review and development process.
