INFLUENZA VACCINATION -- The University Health Services is recommending annual Influenza Vaccine for persons of all ages who have chronic medical conditions such as: heart disease of any kind; high blood pressure; chronic bronchopulmonary disorders such as as asthma, chronic bronchitis, emphysema, etc. Immunization clinics will be held in the University Health Services, Mezzanine, Main Building, from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. on Tuesdays, and from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. on Thursdays, beginning on October 15. A limited amount of vaccine is available and appointments should be made by calling ext. 324. Immunization is free to students. A nominal charge will be made to faculty and employees.
