Mass. Memories Road Show Your Place in Massachusetts History

University Archives & Special Collections in the Joseph P. Healey Library, in collaboration with communities throughout Massachusetts

Summary/Abstract

The Mass. Memories Road Show is an event-based public history project that digitizes family photographs and stories shared by the people of Massachusetts. We work with local communities to organize free public events where everyone is invited to bring photographs to be scanned and included in the archives at UMass Boston.

Goals and Objectives

- Document local history.
- Bring together community
 members of all ages,
 ethnicities, races and
 backgrounds in lively and
 thoughtfully orchestrated public
 events.
- Validate and celebrate each person's family history and contribution to a community, whether they have lived there for generations or are recently arrived.
- Build and strengthen connections within the communities of Massachusetts.
- Establish a digital archive of primary sources related to Massachusetts history, culture, and community.



Approaches and Methods

Each Road Show is held in a public space and consists of "stations" devoted to specific functions. Contributors move from one station to another having their photographs digitized and their stories recorded. Contributors complete paperwork providing data on their photos and granting permission to include their photos in our collection.

In addition to having their photos scanned, contributors are invited to share a brief story about their photographs on camera. Local historians and archivists are on site to provide advice on organizing, dating, and preserving their photographs.

Results/Impacts

To date, the Mass. Memories Road Show has digitized more than 5,000 photographs and stories from across the state, creating an educational resource of primary sources for future generations. Over time, we plan to visit each of the 351 cities and towns in Massachusetts.

Conclusion/Next Steps

Following each Road Show, UMass Boston archivists process all digitized photographs and stories and ensure permanent inclusion of the digital and paper records in University Archives & Special Collections. As part of the overall responsibilities of the department, archivists work with researchers to access and use photographs and stories from the collection.

Copies of photographs and stories are given to local partners and many partners produce a video or exhibit to highlight the results of the Road Show.
