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COASTSWEEP: The Massachusetts Coastal Cleanup Program

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Summary/Abstract

Volunteers in communities throughout Massachusetts turn out in large numbers each September and October for COASTSWEEP, the statewide coastal cleanup program sponsored by the Massachusetts Office of Coastal Zone Management (CZM) and coordinated by the Urban Harbors Institute (UHI) University of Massachusetts Boston.

COASTSWEEP is part of the International Coastal Cleanup (ICC) organized by Ocean Conservancy in

Washington, DC. Through the efforts of the ICC, volunteers from all over the world collect marine debris and record information about the trash they collect. This information



is then analyzed and used to identify sources of debris and to develop education and policy initiatives to help reduce marine debris globally.

Goals and Objectives

COASTSWEEP Promotes a cleaner environment through education and community service. The program's goals include:

- Educating people about marine debris (the sources, impacts, and solutions)
- Encouraging people to participate in COASTSWEEP events
- Removing marine debris from the environment
- Contributing to the ICC's efforts to reduce marine debris globally

Approaches and Methods

COASTSWEEP partners with community volunteers who offer to serve as coordinators for specific events. Coordinators work with COASTSWEEP to:

- Identify the cleanup site(s)
- Recruit volunteers
- Secure permission from beach managers
- Notify the press; and
- Collect data from volunteers

In return, COASTSWEEP provides Coordinators with:

- Cleanup supplies (bags, gloves, safety instructions, data cards, pencils)
- Educational information about marine debris
- Event publicity on the COASTSWEEP
 Webpage, FaceBook Page, and Twitter

Results/Impacts

2012 marked the 25th Anniversary of COASTSWEEP, and more than 40 Massachusetts towns hosted 150+ cleanups from Plum Island to Provincetown! This year alone,

Provincetown! This year alone, 2,700 volunteers removed and recorded the details of

14,620 pounds of marine debris from 145 miles of coastline.

Since 2003, nearly 25,000 volunteers have participated and removed more than 234,000 pounds of debris which would have otherwise ended up in our oceans. The data from cleanups is used to:



- Deepen the understanding of marine debris sources and impacts
- Build a social movement to demand Trash Free Seas
- Engage industry to develop solutions
- Promote policy reform

COASTSWEEP continues to advance the University's commitment volunteerism and the environment throughout Massachusetts.
