Patricia McBride was elected president of the class which also included security personnel from the MBTA Police Department and a Braintree Police Department officer. Edward Cox was Vice-president.

Number One in the class scholastically was James Wise from UMass-Boston.

President Robert C. Wood has made it clear that he does not agree with recommendations to decrease state support for higher public education.

In a statement issued last week, he said. "Secretary Cowin's recommendations to the Governor respecting next year's support of the state's universities and colleges must disturb all of us in higher education. I regret especially that Secretary Cowin has apparently chosen to ignore the advice of his colleague. Secretary Cronin, and of the Board of Higher Education, in making his recommendations on the Fiscal 1975 budget.

"Secretary Cowin's self-confessed bias toward private institutions is a poor perspective from which to make a realistic analysis of the budgets of public higher education. At a time when both public and private institutions are making determined efforts to develop workable patterns of collaboration, he seems to have chosen a simplistic approach that would serve neither

education nor the taxpayer.

'Secretary Cowin's formula for higher education includes a virtual freeze on enrollment growth in the public sector, a complete freeze on increases in state scholarship aid, and an increase in tuition charges at public colleges and universities.

"The result of applying this formula to the state budget is inevitable: fewer young men and women will be able to go to college, either because there is no room for them or because they cannot afford it. I do not believe this is a policy the Legislature is prepared to accept."

Prof. Robert J. Steamer of the Politics Department has been named Acting Dean of College II, succeeding Dr. Walter G. Rosen who has resigned.

Prof. Steamer is an authority on American Public Law, Political Thought and Theory, and among his books are The Constitution: Cases and Comments and The Supreme Court in Crisis: A History of Conflict.

He has his Doctorate from Cornell University and did post doctoral studies at Oxford. He has taught at Oglethorpe University, UMass-Amherst Louisiana State University, and came to UMass-Boston from Lake Forest College, where he was Chairman of the Department of Government. At Lake Forest, one senior class in its wisdom voted him "Great Teacher of the Year."

In Louisiana he was a staff consultant to the U.S. Civil Rights Commission, and another area of public service was being Police and Fire Commissioner for the City of Lake Forest, Ill.

Dr. Rosen will resume his academic work in plant physiology and as a consultant in biology. Chancellor Golino said, "We look forward to his further contribution to the campus." For Dr. Rosen's talents and efforts on behalf of UMass-Boston, Dr. Golino expressed "our gratitude to him."
