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## New University Accounting System

Effective 7/1/74 the University will implement a new Accounting System. Shortly all College Deans and Department Heads will be informed of changes in administrative requirements for processing documents.

At that time you will be supplied with:

- (a) a Manual of new Subsidiary Accounts and Object Codes;
- (b) a sample Departmental Report;
- (c) a new Department Account number (a stamp will be provided for your convenience); and
- (d) a package of sample documents showing how the various documents should be coded under the new Accounting System.

In the near future workshops will be conducted to assist the departmental Staff in preparing for the new system.

With the cooperation of the Deans, Department Chairman, and Departmental Staff, we will have a successful transition to the New System.

## Science Papers by Students

James G. Shelnut, a student of Prof. J. P. Anselme, delivered a paper entitled "Sulfinyl Hydrazines."

A joint paper by Mary DeRonde and Daniel Driscoll, students of Prof. Leverett J. Zompa, was on "Metal Complex of Cyclic Tridentate Amines."

The Norwell school group is planning to take a campus tour.

## Elected

David Matz, Director of the Legal Services Education Center of the College of Public and Community Service, has been named Chairperson of the Organization of Paralegal Educators, a national organization representing 38 paralegal training programs throughout the United States.

## Torto Assessment Study in Lynn

Prof. Raymond Torto, Chairman, Economics II, was the co-author of a survey of inequitable assessment practices in Lynn. With Prof. Karl Wesolowski of Salem State College, Torto learned that variance in percentage assessments between single and multi-family houses, and variances between lower and upper priced homes, and variances within wards of the city existed. The Lynn Item asked editorially, "Why were the inequalities permitted to occur in the first place?"

## New Trustee

UMass-Boston people are particularly pleased with the naming of Mrs. Catherine Forbes Clark of Dorchester to the University's Board of Trustees. Kit Clark is a community leader who has helped immeasurably in paving the way for a smooth movement of the University to Dorchester. She has served as President of the Dorchester United Neighborhood Association, which includes the major civic organizations in Dorchester. She is also Project Director of the Elderly Nutrition Program for Federated Dorchester Neighborhood Houses Inc.

## Italy and Industrial Change

The Italian Department sponsored a talk by Giovanni Granaglia, International Director of the Agnelli Foundation of Torino, Italy, last week in the College I Auditorium.

He spoke on "Italy's Emergence as an Industrial Nation," noting per capita income has nearly tripled to \$1800 in the past 25 years, and added that Italy is growing as an industrial nation, changing from an agricultural concentration. He was introduced by Prof. Volpe. A reception was hosted by Dr. Golino.



### The Alfred R. Ferguson Prize Fund

Professor Alfred R. Ferguson, who died May 5, 1974, was a widely respected teacher and scholar. He had begun his academic career as a three-letter man and honors graduate of Wooster; and in the last year of his life he served as co-chairman of the University Assembly and as Chief Editor of the Harvard Emerson. Ferg had a zest for life, for literature, and for work; many of us are in his debt. He could be impatient with a maundering committee or colleague, but he was extraordinarily kind and buoyant.

Students, colleagues and friends of Ferg have established a Prize Fund in his honor. Annually the University of Massachusetts at Boston will award one of its undergraduates a prize for distinguished work in American literature.
