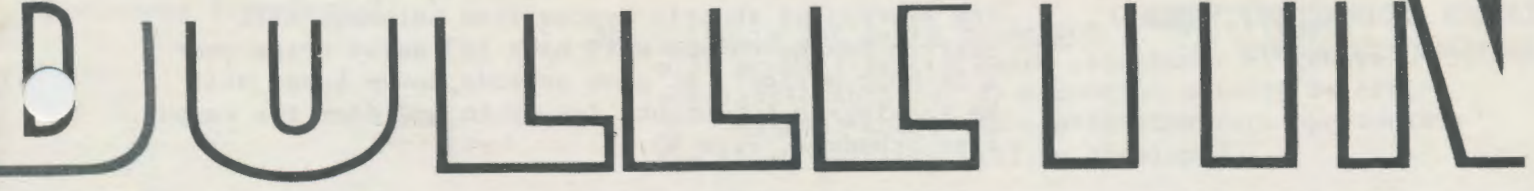

CLASSES BEGIN ON SEPTEMBER 3

The University of Massachusetts at Boston begins its 10th academic year on Tuesday, September 3, when 6,200 students begin their studies at the Harbor Campus in Dorchester.

This will be the first full academic year at the new campus. Last year the first semester was at the "temporary" campus at Park Square; the second semester was held at the new campus.

UMass-Boston will also receive the largest number of new students in its brief history this September.

Some 1500 new freshmen and 1000 transfer students will be enrolled. (7200 Applied)

The College of Public and Community Service, which begins its second academic year at the Park Square campus, will have some 400 students.

A new factor at UMass-Boston this year will be the planning process for the newest college, the College of Professional Studies, which will be accepting students in September, 1975.

Dean Richard Freeland and academic advisors will be assessing the new curriculum offerings.

University trustees recently approved the appointments of two leaders to guide academic affairs at UMass-Boston. Dr. Robert Spaethling, a noted German scholar, was named Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and Provost, and Dr. Robert Steamer, a political scientist and expert on constitutional law, was named Dean of College II.

Legislative approval for the founding of UMass-Boston came in 1964. The first classes at 100 Arlington St. began in September, 1965, with 1000 students.

The new campus site was selected after considerable controversy in 1969

Construction of the \$130-million campus began in 1970 and was opened for classes in January of this year.

Seventy percent of the students and staff at the commuter's university in Dorchester come to campus by public transportation.

The successful shuttle system from Columbia MBTA station to the campus will have 193 daily trips over a 16-hour period. At peak periods seven buses will be running--a two-minute leeway to and from the campus. (See schedule, Page 4)

Orientation for the 2500 new students will be held on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday--August 28, 29, and 30. Chancellor Carlo L. Golino will address the students at Wednesday's meetings.

The theme of the Orientation period will be "The Urban Commuting Student--A Challenge in the Seventies."

Others involved in Orientation will be Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs LeVester Tubbs, Student Trustee of the University Kathy Steed, and faculty and student leaders, including S. Schiavo-Campo and Cynthia Baratz, Co-Chairpersons of the University Assembly, Joseph Bosonac, Chairman, Student Activities Committee; Dean Daisy Tagliacozzo, College I; Gerald J. Sullivan, Associate Dean, College I; Prof. Joel Blair, Chairman, Student-Faculty College I Senate; Dean Robert J. Steamer, College II, and others.

SAVIO SCHOLARSHIP FUND

UMass-Boston has received with gratitude the gift of Ralph Savio and Marion Savio 100 shares of common stock of General Motors Corporation to establish the Vivian Carolyn Savio Scholarship Fund in honor of their daughter, a UMass-Boston student who died a year ago.

The dividends/income alone will be used to assist one or more students each year with the individual grant not to exceed the cost of tuition for a Massachusetts resident. Awards will be made to students registered at the University of Massachusetts at Boston in accordance with the following provisions:

1. Terms of Award: a cash scholarship(s) awarded in the Spring for the following year.
2. Eligibility for Award: at the time of the award a student must be under 25 years of age; must have completed at least one semester at the University of Massachusetts at Boston with a minimum of 12 credit hours; and must have attained a 2.5 scholastic average. Preference for the award will be given to freshmen and sophomores. In the event a second award becomes available, consideration may then be given to deserving juniors. To be eligible, a freshman applicant need not have completed University course work in art, but must indicate interest or involvement in the field, sophomore applicants must have completed at least two

courses in art to be considered.

3. Criteria for Award Selection: three criteria will prevail in the award selection: 1) general scholastic ability; 2) potential ability in art; 3) financial need. An application form appropriate for these criteria will be developed.
4. Award Committee: to be determined by the voting membership of the Art Department as provided for in the departmental by-laws.

VETERANS COUNSELORS

The Veterans Administration has a new program for college campuses to help serve student-veterans more efficiently with their benefits and questions about veterans programs. At UMass-Boston the two representatives are Kevin Joyce and Francis Lynch, both Vietnam War veterans. Their office is on Level One of the Administration Building. Joyce attended UMass-Boston before he entered the Army and also attended Murray State College, Oklahoma. Lynch attended Boston University. Student-veterans at UMass-Boston are fortunate these men have been assigned to this campus. They are admirably knowledgeable about V. A. benefits and programs. Both are working with Joseph Thomas, UMass-Boston's Veterans Coordinator.

PERSONNEL POLICY FOR PROFESSIONAL
NON-ACADEMIC STAFF

On October 1, 1974 the University of Massachusetts at Boston will begin implementation of the Personnel Policy for Professional Non-Academic Staff (BOT Doc. T73-090 Rev.). In all probability the section which will be of greatest interest to those covered by the policy is that entitled Employment Security. Upon implementation, appointments and reappointments that have occurred in the interim will be renegotiated to reflect the provisions of the new policy. The Personnel Office will promulgate further information concerning specific sections of the policy as it pertains to the Boston Campus.

Present procedures will remain in effect until implementation. Statements of the new policies are available at the Personnel Office.

GEORGE FRAZIER

Lee Grove, English, is the author of "Tell Me The Truth, Baby, Who Was George Frazier?" in the August issue of Boston Magazine.

Grove analyzes the literary leanings of the late Boston Globe columnist, and believes that George had a "marvelous mellifluity of language, that Johnsonian balance of phrase." Grove's elegy to Frazier is worth reading. Frazier's elegy to John O'Hara is used in Grove's freshman English classes here.
