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

This week group leaders for the campus United Way Campaign will be distributing pledge cards, explaining the programs of the United Way, and pointing out that an easy way to give through payroll deductions is available here.

Vice Chancellor for Administration and Finance William R. Hamilton, Jr., is urging support for all the vital community missions of the United Way. Robert Brady, Hamilton's administrative assistant, is helping to coordinate the campaign.

In past years UMass-Boston personnel have been generous to appeals. This year, the campus volunteer workers are seeking 100 percent participation --- in all the colleges, the academic and support departments, and all around the campus.

On Thursday, November 21, 5:30 p.m., Room 44, College I, Martin F. Feeney will speak on "From Alcatraz to Walpole: 13,000 Days and Nights in Prison."

The first exhibition in the new art gallery in College II, first floor, is now under way with recent paintings by Ellen Banks. The exhibit is well worthwhile and will continue through November 15th. In future weeks the art gallery committee is planning to exhibit paintings and other art work by members of the faculty and staff.

The first event in this year's Performance Series, sponsored by the Cultural Events Organization of the Student Activities Committee, will be held on Sunday, November 10 at 3 p.m. in Symphony Hall. Tickets are still available at the SAC office (College II, Room 425) and College II auditorium ticket office, at the reduced prices for faculty and staff (\$3 and \$2).

The artist for this performance is Russell Sherman, one of the truly extraordinary planists performing today. The Boston Globe music critic says his playing is "astonishing."

Professor Barbara Luedtke (Anthropology, C-II) is trying to get the blessings of the town fathers in Watertown to conduct a survey to evaluate and salvage archaeological materials from the Watertown Arsenal site. (Does anyone remember that site as a possibility for UMass-Boston?) Professor Luedtke says the site is presumed to be rich in materials from the period 2000-1000 BC.

Some 40 students turned out for the first practice session for the first athletic team in UMass-Boston history last week. And the sport is basketball.

A team, which will eventually have a squad of 15 members, will represent the university in a schedule of games this year beginning with an invitational tournament at Essex Aggy, November 20. Our team has drawn Chamberlayne Junior College as its first opponent.

How do you like that "our team"?

Practice sessions are being held at the McCormack School while our gymnasium is still non-functioning because of water damage. Home games will be played at Brown and Nichols in Cambridge.

James Worsham, Boston Globe education writer, had an interesting article on the learning situation in Boston's middle schools--6th, 7th, and 8th grades--and gives a tip of the hat to the efforts of the Institute for Learning and Teaching.

Institute staffers have been working with faculty at the Mary E. Curley Middle School, Boston State College professors, and Boston School Department reading specialists.

According to Worsham, the youngsters are excited about learning, adding new skills, and making the students more inquisitive about learning.
