### Dean Steamer on Supreme Court

Dean Robert J. Steamer, College II, was a panelist with Pulitzer Prize winner Anthony Lewis of the New York Times at the Southern Political Science Association meeting in New Orleans. Steamer spoke on "The Supreme Court and Fundamental Rights."

Incidentally, Dean Steamer's address to the faculty of College II is a thoughtful, incisive document on what a university's nature is, its role as a guardian of academic freedom, and is an appraisal of the role of a liberal arts education. It rang like Newman's ideas on a university.

### Nantucket Studies

The National Endowment for the Humanities has awarded a grant to College II to enable the University to establish an academic program on Nantucket Island. Fifteen juniors and seniors will be chosen to spend second semester on the island, and another fifteen will be selected for the Fall semester of next year. Students enrolled in the Program will take fifteen credit hours of academic study, dealing intensively with Nantucket's history and culture.

Normal tuition fees will cover the academic costs of the Program. Students will have to pay room and board costs on the Island, though the University will locate suitable living arrangements and will attempt to locate part-time jobs for those who need them. Any University junior or senior in good academic standing may apply for admission to the Program, regardless of what college he or she is enrolled in and what program of study. Preference will be given to applicants who can demonstrate intellectual initiative and maturity, and whose academic interests are consonant with the resources of the Program.

Application forms can be picked up from Barry Phillips, Assistant Professor of English, College II, and Director of the Nantucket Program, in II.5.212, or in the College II Dean's Office. Applications are due Wednesday, November 20, though extensions can be obtained from Mr. Phillips.

## Book Reviewers and a Book Reviewed

It seems that since Margaret Manning became the new Book Editor of the Boston Globe Lee Grove and Shaun O'Connell (English II) have become almost daily book reviewers. John Hersey's new book My Petition For More Space was a Grove review which rang no bells for Adano. Grove said "nothing, nothing moves in this novel, or is moved" including the reader. O'Connell assesses The Last Days of Louisiana Red by Ishmael Reed who "plays the literary parallels and put-ons game so marvelously his novel consumes itself in its own fun.." O'Connell also reviewed (Nov. 14) The Poor Mouth: A Bad Story About The Hard Life by Flann O'Brien. O'Connell calls it a "jumble of folk tale, myth, black comedy and straight-up Oirish blarney."

Grove is the author of Boston magazine's lead article in the November issue on Frank Sinatra, titled "Last Night When We Were Young." The same issue has an article on poet Ann Sexton by former faculty member Dan Wakefield.

American Transcendentalism by Professor Paul F. Boller Jr. (History II) won a rave review in the Sunday Herald-Advertiser (Nov. 10). "This is a book about people who sought to bring more life into their lives, and scholar and layman alike will be made a little more alive by taking a deep breath of the exhilarating air coming through the window Professor Boller has opened for us."

## Women's Status in Sierra Leona

Madam Honoria Bailor-Caulker, woman Paramount Chief and Member of Parliament, Republic of Sierra Leone, West Africa, will present a lecture on "My Career: The Role and Status Women in the Republic of Sierra Leone," Wednesday, November 20 at 12:30 p.m. at the College II Auditorium.

Madam Honoria Bailor-Caulker's talk is being co-sponsored by Sociology II, Ujima Society and University Year of Action. All are cordially invited.

## Tax Reform

Joseph S. Slavet, Director of the Boston Urban Observatory, was one of several keynote speakers at the recent Annual Meeting of the Massachusetts League of Cities and Towns. He addressed members of the League on the issue of tax reform and chaired a panel of specialists discussing selected aspects of the problem which included Sen. Frederick W. Schlosstein, Senate Chairman, Committee on Taxation; Gregory Anrig, Massachusetts Commissioner of Education; William S. Taupier, Mayor of Holyoke; and Stuart DeBard, Executive Director, Association of Town Finance Committees. Mr. Slavet is providing consultant services to the League under a contract between the City of Boston and UMass-Boston in coordinating development of a tax reform package for consideration by the 1975 session of the Massachusetts Legislature.

## Campus Visitors

Some 50 high school students, members of the Junior Engineering Technical Society, were here Saturday for a seminar on effective communications. Dr. Ernest Becker (Chemistry) spoke on communications as a career objective for scientists and engineers, and the evaluation of aptitudes for science-engineering-communications careers.

The Department of Political Economy (College II) had many Boston College High School students here yesterday for the John Kenneth Galbraith lecture.
