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

John F. Kennedy Library

Robert Spiller, Chairman of the Trustee Committee on Buildings and Grounds, said he was good at reading maps and proceeded with the assistance of Trustee Robert Gordon to point out at the Trustees meeting last week where the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library would be located at the Harbor Campus.

Spiller made the motion and it was voted that: "In accordance with the provisions of a pending special act of the Legislature, to authorize the President of the University to execute a deed and such other documents as may be necessary to effectuate a conveyance of the parcel of land at the Harbor Campus described in the Act to the United States of America to provide a site for the presidential archival depository of the John Fitzgerald Kennedy Library."

After the meeting, President Robert Wood, Vice President Nan Robinson and Presidential Assistant Joseph Cass proceeded from the John W. McCormack State Office Building to the State House office of Senate President Kevin Harrington to report the Trustees' action.

Legislation is expected to be filed shortly on transferring the library site land to the General Services Administration, the Federal agency which operates the Library.

Chancellor Carlo L. Golino was the keynote speaker at the Spring Conference of the Massachusetts Foreign Language Association held on May 1 at Waltham Senior High School. The conference theme was "The Facets of Foreign Language." Chancellor Golino told the language instructors that the teaching and learning of foreign languages must be upgraded, if full enrichment is to be achieved by both teachers and students.

Among the faculty of various universities and high schools directing workshop sessions was Prof. Gerald Volpe, Italian I.

The March, 1976 issue of the National Tax Journal contains a special symposium on state and regional government financing of city government services (edited by Professor Roy Bahl of Syracuse University) that includes an article called "Shifting Local Services To The State: Boston" by Joseph S. Writing Evaluation	Prof. Roz Rosenmeier, College of Public and Community Service is a member of a six-person committee assigned the task of evaluating the Writing Program at MIT. The other members of the committee (in addition to two MIT faculty) are: Professor William Alfred of the Harvard Eng- lish Department, Professor William Perry of the Harvard Bureau of Study, and Mr. Robert Cowan, Science Editor of the Christian Science Monitor. The committee is chaired by Professor Nathan Sivin of the Technology Studies Department at MIT.

Slover Wins Fellowship	Prof. Loretta Porto Slover (Spanish and Portuguese II) has been awarded a dissertation fellowship from the American Associ- ation of University Women. The grant funds a year of research and writing. Prof. Slover's dissertation will explore the re- lationship between the imaginative portrait of women present- ed in The Three Marias: New Portuguese Letters on the one hand and the sociopolitical situation of women in Portugal on the other. She is a Ph. D. candidate in the Department of Ro- mance Languages and Literatures at Harvard University.
Health Plan	The Harvard Community Health Plan, (HCHP) became avail- able to employees of UMass-Boston in the fall of 1974. At that time many employees converted from the Aetna plan to HCHP. Through June 4, 1976 the option to convert to HCHP, as well as to convert back to Aetna, is available. Employees may call the Personnel Office, at Ext. 2271 or 72, in order to arrange a mutually convenient time for filling out con- version forms. Conversions will become effective on July 1, 1976.
	Under its expanded coverage, HCHP provides full maternity benefits to females with individual coverage and without a deductible; preventative dental care is offered for children under 12 years of age; coverage is expanded for durable med- ical appliances.
	The present cost of premium is as follows: AETNA\$10.71 (individual) and \$24.68 (family), HCHP\$5.11 (individual) and \$15.77 (family).
