NERCHE is now accepting nominations for the *2011 Ernest A. Lynton Award for the Scholarship of Engagement for Early Career Faculty*. This annual award recognizes a faculty member who is pre-tenure at tenure-granting campuses and early career (i.e., within the first six years) at campuses with long-term contracts and who connects his or her teaching, research, and service to community engagement. #### **Project Compass hosts two Learning Community Meetings**

In the 2010-2011 academic year, NERCHE has hosted two Learning Community Meetings for the four campuses participating in Project Compass, a multi-year regional initiative to help more underserved students succeed in and graduate from public four-year institutions of higher education in New England. Learning Community Meetings are opportunities for the participating campuses to update each other on the progress of their interventions aimed at ending disparities in the persistence and success of subpopulations of students, and to explore relevant theories and practices emerging from recent scholarship.

The [first meeting](#) (November 2010) focused on campus efforts to sustain a culture of responsiveness that will develop after current grant funds have ended, while the [second meeting](#) (February 2011) explored transformative pedagogies in response to new populations of students.

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### **Next Generation Engagement Project participants meet**

Participants in NERCHE's Next Generation Engagement Project met January 23-24, 2011, in Providence, RI, to develop a book proposal and conference presentations related to the initiative. The project is a collaboration among NERCHE, the [American Association of State Colleges and Universities \(AASCU\)](#), [Imagining America](#), and a group of recognized scholars and practitioners to develop and implement civic engagement initiatives aimed at the next generation of students, faculty, and scholars in higher education.

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### **NERCHE partners with the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching**

NERCHE and the [Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching](#) have entered into a long-term partnership for the continuation of the elective Carnegie Community Engagement Classification, which defines community engagement as "the collaboration between institutions of higher education and their larger communities...for the mutually beneficial exchange of knowledge and resources in a context of partnership and reciprocity."

In January 2011, the Carnegie Foundation selected 115 U.S. colleges and universities to receive its 2010 Community Engagement Classification. NERCHE served as Carnegie's "administrative partner" for the purpose of managing and administering the classification process.
