#### The General Election

##### By the Numbers

A total of 68 women across the Commonwealth are running for the Massachusetts Legislature. This number includes one female write-in candidate.

##### House of Representatives

- In 23 races, women are running with opposition; *there are a total of 28 women in races with opposition as some districts have more than one female candidate.*
- 26 women are running unopposed.
- In 6 House races, women are running for open seats; *in 4 of these races, there are male candidates in the race, in one race two female candidates are running against each other, and in one a woman is running unopposed.*
- In 4 races, female incumbents face female challengers.
- 8 women are challenging male incumbents.
- 6 female incumbents are facing male challengers.

##### State Senate

- In 13 races, there are women candidates.
- In 5 races, women face opposition; one of these races has two women running for the seat.
- In 2 races, women are running for open seats; women are running against male candidates in both of these races.
- 1 male incumbent faces a female challenger.
- In 2 races, female incumbents face male challengers.



### Women of Color in the Legislature

- According to the Women’s Pipeline for Change, women of color currently constitute 10.2% of the 49 women serving in the legislature.
- There are only 5 women of color running in the General Election in November and all five are incumbents. Four are running unopposed and one is running against a challenger.
