The following schedule is from the Registrar's Office:

October 1 - November 1 Registration period for Pass/Fail option in the Registrar's Office, 131 Arlington Street. A student may elect one course each semester to a maximum of eight on a Pass/Fail basis. The credits for a grade of PASS will be added to the graduation credits but will not be included in the quality points or cumulative average. A grade of "F" will be computed as a regular "F" in the cumulative grade average.

November 1 Mid Semester

December 1 - 11 Pre-Registration for Spring Semester

January 8 Last day to DROP a course. Students should obtain a pink DROP card from either the Registrar's or Advising Office, complete the card and return it to the Registrar's Office in order to receive a "W" which is not computed in the grade point average. A student may drop a course subject to the minimum load regulations (12 credit hours for a regular student).

New regulation on Failed Courses A failed course, if repeated and a passing grade achieved, is not included in student's quality point and cumulative average. The Registrar's Office has adjusted the records of all presently active students who have subsequently passed originally failed courses.
