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Success Boston College Completion Initiative

Summary of Success Boston

2008: Initiative launches in response to Northeastern University study finding – only 35.5% of Boston Public School (BPS) graduates enrolled in college earned an Associate's or Bachelor's degree within 7 years (despite BPS having one of the highest college enrollment rates in country).

2010: 38 colleges/universities in MA accepted UMass Boston Chancellor Keith Motley's invitation to join the initiative (25 submitted specific plans). Chancellor Motley is co-chair of Mayor's Success Boston Task Force.

July 2010: UMass Boston implements Success Boston Embedded Model: Collaboration with American Student Assistance (ASA), Freedom House Inc., Bottom Line and Hyde Square Task Force to provide transitional coaching to BPS graduates at UMass Boston.

Goals and Objectives

- To increase the percentage of Boston Public School graduates who successfully complete college graduation requirements.

City-wide Goals:

- 2009 Cohort Goal: 52%
- 2011 Cohort Goal: 70%

UMass Boston Goals:

- 2011 Cohort Goal: 56.7%

Results/Impacts

UMass Boston's data continues to show progress

- **Second Year Retention** of Fall 2011 First-time Full-Time Freshmen (*BPS graduates were significantly more likely to return than others*):
84.7% BPS compared to 77.8% non-BPS
- Success Boston participants **on track to graduate in six years** (*had earned at least a 2.5 GPA and 24 credits by the end of their first year*):

2008 Cohort: 26%
2009 Cohort: 36%
2010 Cohort: 41%
2011 Cohort: 42%

Approaches and Methods

Core Strategies of UMass Boston's Model:

- Based on best practices research
- Intrusive/transition coaching
- Personalized case management
- Targeted activities to connect, engage and start and keep students on track toward graduation

Coaches:

- Reach out at key times (semester's beginning/end) & before deadlines (add/drop, withdrawal; preregistration)
- Support students with academic/non-academic needs

Peer Mentors:

- Assigned to entering freshmen as models to show how they handled similar experiences/challenges.

Special Activities to Support Transition:

- 2-day Transition to College Symposium
- Welcome reception & End of year celebration
- FAFSA renewal party

Conclusion/Next Steps

- Implement an initiative to ensure BPS students entering the university have completed financial aid process and necessary documentation to be on track financially.
- Continue to review and introduce best practices based on the needs of participants in Success Boston to keep them on track towards their ultimate goal – a college degree.
