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Latinos *in* Framingham

Part of a Series of Profiles of Latinos in Massachusetts Completed with Support from the Boston Foundation.

The Mauricio Gastón Institute for Latino Community Development and Public Policy

The Mauricio Gastón Institute for Latino Community Development and Public Policy was established at the University of Massachusetts at Boston in December of 1989. The creation of the Gastón Institute responds to the need for better understanding of the experience and conditions of life of Latinos in the Commonwealth! Its purpose is to conduct research about the Latino population in Massachusetts and to develop the kind of information and analysis necessary for the development of sound public policy and for the effective participation of the Latino population in public policy development in the Commonwealth. In an effort to facilitate access to vital information about Latinos to various audiences, and with support from the Boston Foundation, the Gastón Institute has produced a series of basic demographic profiles for selected cities in the Commonwealth based on the 1990 United States Census. These profiles are but one part of the Gastón Institute's broader initiative to disseminate the 1990 United States Census and to address other relevant aspects of the social and economic situation of Latinos in the Commonwealth.

General population changes in the city of Framingham reflected statewide trends, with the black, Latino and Asian populations growing faster than the non-Latino white population, and Latinos growing in absolute number more than blacks and Asians. Between 1980 and 1990 the total population of Framingham decreased by 0.2% and its composition changed substantially. The total Latino population of Framingham grew from 2,186 in 1980 to 5,291 in 1990, for an inter-censal increase of 142%. While in 1980 Latinos represented 3.4% of the total population of Framingham, in 1990 they represented 8.1% of the population. As of 1990, Framingham had the twelfth largest absolute number of Latinos in Massachusetts, and its Latino population as a proportion of the total population of the city ranked tenth in the Commonwealth. The number of non-Latino whites decreased by 8.5% between 1980 and 1990, and the number of non-Latino blacks and Asians increased by 51.4% and 178% respectively.

¹ Latino will be used throughout to refer to a person living in the United States of Puerto Rican, Cuban, Dominican, or Mexican ancestry as well as other Spanish-speaking people from Central or South American countries.

Puerto Ricans and "Other" Latinos were the largest Latino subgroups in Framingham. Latinos in the "Other" category are from the Dominican Republic, Central and South America.² Mexicans, Cubans and Puerto Ricans in Framingham decreased between 1980 and 1990, while the number of "Other" Latinos more than quadrupled, almost surpassing Puerto Ricans as the largest Latino subgroup in the city. Between 1980 and 1990 the share of "Other" Latinos grew from 24.9% of the total Latino population to 41.8%, while Puerto Ricans decreased from 64.1% to 50.4%.

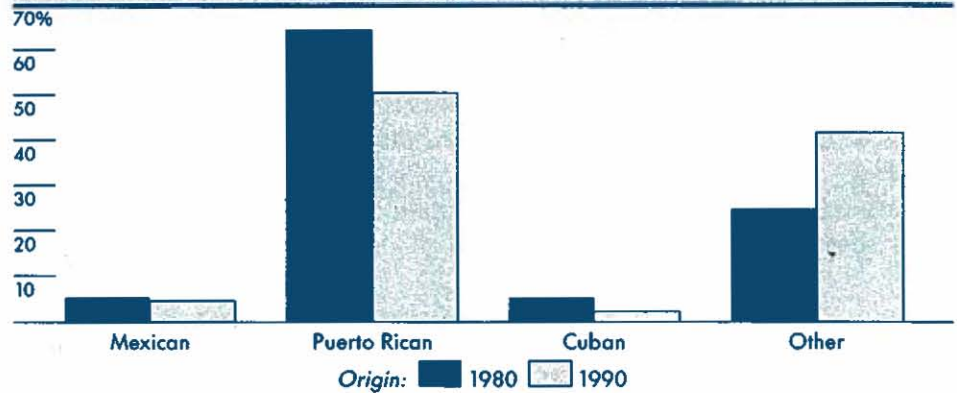

Framingham: Latino Population by Age for 1980 and 1990

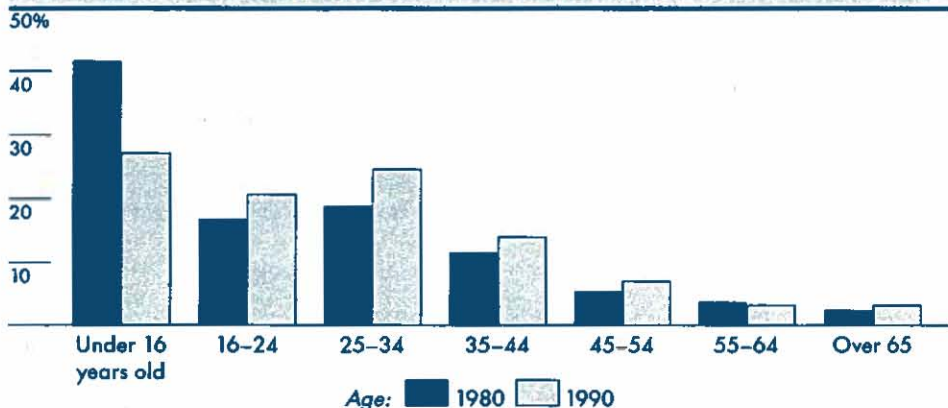

Framingham: Latino Population by Age

The Latino population in the city of Framingham, while remaining relatively young, became older in general. Latino median age increased from 19.3 years in 1980 to 25.8 years in 1990. While Latinos 24 years of age or younger represented 58.1% of the total Latino population in 1980, they represented 47.8% in 1990. Conversely, for the same period, the share of Latinos between 25 and 54 years of age increased from 35.7% to 45.6%, and the share of Latinos 55 years of age older increased slightly from 6.3% to 6.6%.

²It is not possible to disaggregate the "Other" Latino category so as to differentiate the share of those individuals from the Dominican Republic, South and Central American countries. Still unpublished 1990 U.S. Census data by nativity would further permit some degree of differentiation.

In general, the median age of both Latino males and females in Framingham increased, although Latino females continued to be relatively older than Latino males. Median age for Latino males increased from 20.8 years in 1980 to 23.9 years in 1990, while for Latino females it increased from 21.3 years to 26.1 years.

Between 1980 and 1990 in Framingham, the composition of the Latino population by household type did not change dramatically. Among the most evident changes were a decline in the share of married-couple households with children, an increase in the share of households without related children, and an increase in the share of male-headed households. The share of householders living alone and living with unrelated individuals increased by a small percentage. Contrary to commonly held views, the percentage of female-headed households with children declined while those without related children increased only slightly during this period.

Latinos in Massachusetts

The following charts correspond directly to those on the previous pages and offer a quick reference to the population, age and household status of Latinos in Massachusetts.

In brief:

- The total population of Massachusetts increased from 5,737,037 in 1980 to 6,016,425, with Latinos growing in absolute number more than any other racial/ethnic group, becoming the largest minority group in the Commonwealth.
- Puerto Ricans and "Other" Latinos were the largest Latino subgroups in the state, accounting respectively for 2.5% and 1.9% of the total population. (Latinos in the "Other" category are from the Dominican Republic, Central and South America.)
- The Latino population, while remaining relatively young, became older in general, with the Latino median age increasing from 21.2 years in 1980 to 23.7 years in 1990.
- The median age of both Latino males and females increased between 1980 and 1990, with the median age for Latino males increasing from 20.3 years in 1980 to 23.1 years in 1990, and Latino females' median age increasing from 22.2 years to 24.3 years.
