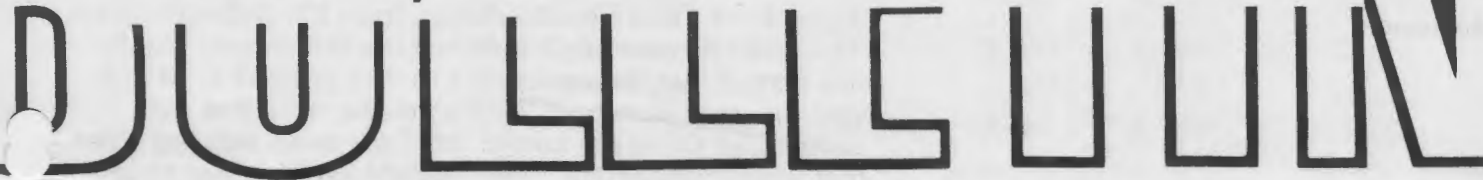

Political Reform

John S. Saloma (Politics) is the author of a Boston Globe (October 8) article on "Aftermath of Conventions: Spirited Citizen Revolt." Lithgow returned to teach at Antioch where he established and directed the Antioch Shakespeare Festival. The performing arts festivals at Toledo, Akron and Cleveland were established by him before he went to Princeton, N.J., as Executive Director of the McCarter Theatre at Princeton University. He also helped develop the off-Broadway Circle in the Square Theatre.
