Basic Educational Opportunity
Grant

Faculty are urged to announce in their freshman classes that freshman who entered college for the first time after July 1, 1973, can still apply for Basic Grants for this year. The deadline has been extended to April 1, 1974. These are grants to cover Fall and Spring semesters of this year and range from \$52 to \$452. Applications are available in the Financial Aid Office, Second Floor, Administration Building, or in Dean's Office of College I and II. (Self-supporting students and those living with parents earning less than \$11,000 are probably eligible).

Chemistry Seminar

The Department of Chemistry is sponsoring a seminar on "Molecular Dynamics Visualized", a demonstration lecture by Robert C. Plumb, Head, Department of Chemistry, Worcester Polytechnic Institute, on Wednesday, March 20, at 7:30 p.m. in Room 6, First Level of the Science Bldg.

Collisions, speed distribution, vacancies, flickering clusters, physical absorption, dynamic equilibrium - and more will be demonstrated with a device which the speaker has developed - which gives clear visual pictures of the dynamic behavior of molecules.

Donna Woolf

Prof. Edward Gittleman (College II) recently gave a memorable eulogy at the graveside ceremonies for Donna Woolf, an English major, who died last month. She was doing an honors thesis at the time of her death on "Women and Poetry in Ben Jonson" and gave special attention in her studies to Ralph Waldo Emerson.

In the eulogy, Prof. Gittleman said, "Donna was one of those very rare individuals who understood that knowledge comes not only from books but also from sources -- and resources -- within one's own self; that knowledge comes not only from experience but also from awareness that every occurrence -- even the most ordinary -- is a type of miracle; that knowledge comes not only from intelligence but also from sensitivity -- sensitivity which perceives that the world is always alive and therefore must continually be loved; and that knowledge comes not only from remembering the past but also from discovering in the present moment new facts which are memorable...."

"The lessons she taught us at UMass-Boston are both unforgettable and full of hope. She knew -- as did Ralph Waldo Emerson -- that every day begins with illumination. "The sun shines today also," even above a clouded sky. May we prove worthy of our recollections of her."

The University community expresses its profound sympathy to her husband Howard, a graduate student in English, and to her family.
